

The wisdom of good foundations

Have you ever regularly walked past a house that is being newly built? They take a lot of time on the foundations. It is essential to build on good solid foundations, and to have things correctly marked out and measured with the correct floorplan and footprint. If the foundations are not solid, cracks in your building will appear as one part of the building sinks or moves relative to another. If you build outside the foundation, that also is very probably going to end in disaster.

Paul spoke about the wisdom of having good foundations in 1 Corinthians 3. Paul wrote that when he planted the church, he did so like a 'skilled master builder'. He laid a foundation — which is 'Jesus Christ'. Both 'Jesus' — his identity, and 'Christ' his mission. Paul said in 1 Corinthians 2v2 that he preached Jesus, and him crucified.

So firstly this foundation is 'Jesus' — the divine God-man. The identity of Jesus himself. He is the 'radiance of the Father's glory' (Hebrews 1). He is the revelation of God as revealed in the scriptures. His values, his character, his truth, his teaching and his example. And being in relationship with the resurrected Jesus is also part of that foundation.

Secondly this foundation is 'Christ'. The Greek word Christ means Messiah or 'Chosen One'. His death on the cross creates a way in which we can be saved. We can have eternal life and newness of life as we trust that forgiveness and reconciliation is available through believing in him and his death on the cross. It is a demonstration of his love and grace.

It is on this foundation, and within it's boundaries that we build lives to honour God. Wisdom is to build on him — the living Word. Then we will be able to stand when things get tough. If we have a firm foundation we can then grow creatively and securely in his love and beauty and in the power of His Holy Spirit to the glory of his name.

♦ Fellowship Walk: Sunday 2nd November

We will have our monthly fellowship walk as usual on the first Sunday after the morning service. This month we will, weather permitting, be walking across the Menai Bridge and around coastal areas of Menai Bridge town (around Church Island, along Belgian Promenade, under the bridge); a paved 3km circular route. Canolfan Penrallt

Our community centre, Canolfan Penrallt, is intended to provide a service for and a bridge with our local community. It includes our main hall (where we meet for tea, coffee and a chat after morning services) with a recently refurbished kitchen, as well as the Twrgwyn Room (the smaller meeting room across the corridor from the church office, on your left as you head in to the hall). These facilities are available to hire for a modest fee, with a discounted rate for community groups.

Several groups (including a choir and two dance groups) regularly hold their activities in the Canolfan and there is space in our calendar to accommodate standalone bookings from individuals or groups as well as further regular bookings (especially during the daytime; NB Saturdays are reserved for one-off bookings and church events).

Bangor Cathedral Foodbank (www.bangorfoodbank.org) is open 2 – 3pm every Monday, Wednesday and Friday, operating from Tŷ Deiniol (the Diocesan Centre) next to Bangor Cathedral. They are able to give people up to two emergency food parcels without a referral from another service. Mosaic church have a Foodbank at Coed Mawr Community Centre, open on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday mornings, 9:30 – 11am. Contact Christine King on 07734 667011.

Focus on ...



Bangor Street Pastors

Showing God's love in practical ways

Street Pastors are not a strange sight on the streets of Bangor, despite the ups and downs in our operational ability since we started in November 2010. We soon became a strong, Christlike influence, establishing good links with the police, local government and the users and providers of the night-time economy. Bangor Street Pastors are part of a network of groups across the UK and round the world that seek to live out Jesus' command to love our neighbours. Over time, we became known to those who we met out and about at night on the streets of Bangor, and they came to regard us as a trustworthy, non-judgemental group, who were ready to listen, care and help, not taking into consideration the sexuality, religion, racial origin or personal status of the people we were helping — we were simply there to help. More or less every week (and sometimes more often), in all weathers, for almost 10 years. Then Covid hit...

All street pastor activities were suspended during the lockdown and, once it lifted, many groups including ours took a while to resume patrols. We found a very different world out there to the one we had left behind in March 2020. We had lost a number of volunteers, so it became much more difficult to get a patrol out every week. Moreover, the nature of the night-time economy had changed beyond recognition, with many establishments that had closed during lockdown not re-opening, and generally far fewer people out drinking heavily and getting themselves into trouble late at night. Even now, as things are gradually picking up, it is not quite the same as it was before.

Some changes are positive — in general there's much more moderate consumption of alcohol, girls are tending to wear more sensible footwear that they can comfortably keep on all night, etc. Some changes are less positive — we are seeing an increase in drug usage and spiking as well as mental health and emotional issues. Whilst we have been fortunate so far in Bangor, the UK as a whole has also seen a marked increase in knife crime and antisocial behaviour. There is still plenty of work for street pastors to do, but we need the Lord's wisdom as we seek to adapt our operational practices to fit both the currently available resources (with a smaller team than the 11 we started with, let alone our peak numbers of around 28 members a few years later) and the situations we find ourselves in. At present we are usually going out about once or twice a month, generally earlier in the evening (8pm to midnight, rather than 10pm to 3 or 4am), and we tend to do more listening than providing practical help (although this in itself is a very valuable form of help, demonstrating God's love and care).

As well as more volunteers for the team, and both prayer and financial support, we are currently looking for a new treasurer. Inma has been serving faithfully in this role for many years but is required by our constitution to take a break from next March. Please pray for us to find someone suitable. If you think that person might be you, please speak to Inma or Magnus.
